PRESIDENT'S REPORT



The 2023 – 2024 season has been a great success for the Club in more ways than one. We are currently mid-way through our five-year strategic plan and the Club has progressed strongly in achieving, or on the way to achieving a number of our key objectives.

Future Fund

A highlight of the year was reaching the \$1M Future Fund milestone. June marked the end of our lengthy campaign for the Future Fund. The fund will set the Club up financially for

the future with an additional income stream that is reliable and regular. I extend my gratitude to former President, Jeremy Gillbanks, along with current and past Board members and alumni champions who had the foresight in establishing the Future Fund and who have tirelessly campaigned over the past five years. I also acknowledge the significant financial backing from Gavin Bunning AM. The difference the Future Fund will make from 2025 and beyond can not be overstated.

On the water, our members performed exceptionally.

International

Bronwyn Cox made her second Olympics, selected in the Australian Women's Eight to represent Australia at the Paris Olympics. She helped the crew achieve the best result for an Australian Women's Eight in Olympics history with a fourth-place finish and just 1.2 seconds back from Bronze medalists, Great Britain. This, along with a first place in World Cup 3, is testament to the strength of women's rowing in Australia. Bronnie's achievements continue to inspire our younger rowers, with members taking great delight in broadcasting shoutout messages and cheering for Bronnie and UWABC in her international races. It was a great delight to welcome Bronnie back to the Club at State Championships where she raced in the Championship Women's Double along with Kayla Kalweit, an up-and-coming UWABC member who raced in the Interstate Women's Youth VIII at the National Interstate Regatta earlier this year.

Club Awards

UWABC won the Rowing WA Overall Premiership Pennant for 2024, awarded to the Club with the most points across Grade Pennant regattas, All School regattas and Masters regattas. It is awarded to the most consistent club across all grades and regattas throughout the season. UWABC won the All Schools Championship and won 41 medals in the 2024 State Championship, a massive improvement from just two years ago where we won 24 State Championship Medals. For the Pennant flags, UWABC was awarded with fourth in A-Grade, second in B-Grade, first in C-Grade and first in D-Grade. UWABC was also the winner of the Act Belong Commit Ergo Challenge. A stellar result for the season.

Coaching

The Club thanks Mia Williams, Jonathon Jaschke and Roland Warren for coaching our high performance Nationals athletes over the 2023-24 season. The performance of our athletes at Nationals in 2024 is testament to the skill and dedication of this coaching team. The club also thanks part-time Head Coach, Phil Jurjevich for his service to the Club over the past two winter seasons. Phil has been an incredible addition to our coaching team, he is highly respected and has had a great positive influence on our rowers. In 2025, thanks to the improved financial position of the Club, we have recently appointed Roland Warren as a new full-time Head Coach over summer and winter. Roland will be pivotal in driving the Club's culture, upskilling of all of our coaches and building the depth and skills of our rowers across all squads.

Boat Race Officials from UWABC

Thank you to Craig James OAM, Michael Hawkins, Phill Matthews and Teresa Belcher for their continued support of regattas. Boat Race Officials help our regattas run smoothly and we are fortunate to have steadfast volunteers to assist at our regattas.

Corporate Rowing

This year, the Department of Defence team trained at UWA Boat Club under the guidance of coaches Portia Knight and Sarah Knight. The crew trained during September and October to compete in the Rowing WA Corporate Regatta against 12 other corporate crews. Their hard work and determination were rewarded in winning the Corporate Cup Plate. Congratulations to the Department of Defence.

The UWABC Corporate Rowing program provides companies a unique opportunity for team building, with lessons learnt on the water and through off-water activities that have strong parallels within business. Our coaching team helps corporate rowers in goal setting, building resilience and working as a team. UWABC is already preparing for the 2025 Corporate Regatta and now is an opportune time to get involved in our corporate program, with the annual Rowing WA Corporate Regatta getting stronger each year, with increased media attention and more corporations taking up the challenge.

Alumni Engagement – Events and Boat Christenings

This year, UWABC celebrated 105-years with a Gala Dinner. Guests were entertained by guest speaker and MC Steven Bradbury OAM. Attended by over 100 past members, it was a magical night celebrating the Club and the friendships that have endured.

In 2024, UWABC christened two new boats to our fleet with the *Andrew Brown* Double / Pair and the *Moornie Maali* Coxed Quad and the overdue Christening of the *Michael Morgan*. The occasion was celebrated with a number of our alumni, current members and the wider community.

Life Membership

I would like to congratulate Jeremy Gillbanks on being awarded Life Membership to the Club, as voted at the 2023 Annual General Meeting. His service to the Club in his time on the Committee and as President will have a lasting impact on our Club.

STRATEGIC PILLAR STABILITY

To improve connection, retention and competitiveness, all members, regardless of their ability or racing status, must feel they are receiving good quality coaching and access to equipment that is appropriate to their development. This hinges on the Club's ability to increase its annual operating income. The club's current financial position is not sufficient to provide the required coaching or equipment that allows members to be competitive at all levels of racing and is at risk of losing rowers in pursuit of better equipment and coaching that aligns with their needs. To improve stability and invest in coaching and equipment, the Club needs operating income that it can reliably expect to receive. This means, the Club must diversify where it is currently generating income and cannot rely on membership fees alone to increase funds.


Australian Masters Rowing Championships

World Cups & Paris Olympics

Bronwyn Cox is no stranger to performing on the international stage and 2024 was no exception. With a gold medal at World Cup III in the Women's VIII, Bronnie and her teammates were in high spirits for the Paris Olympics. The girls finished in fourth place, making history as the highest placing Australian Women's VIII at the Olympics. We could not be more proud of Bronnie and the WA girls!

RWA State Championships

In 2022 UWABC received a total of 24 medals at State Championships. The



following year, we increased to 30 and this year at the 2024 RWA State Championships, we came home with 41 medals across all events (11 gold, 13 silver and 17 bronze).

At the 2024 RWA Awards Night, UWABC was successful in bringing home the D grade, C grade and Premiership Pennant Flags!

This is a massive achievement for our Opens, Novice and Junior squads who have been diligently led by our incredible volunteer and part-time coaches. The UWABC Junior Rowing Program for Shenton College students continues to push to new heights with 124 athletes who were coached and mentored by 12 coaches during the season.

Under the leadership of Oliver Cliff

(Coordinator) and Jake Sangster (Coach), Shenton College rowers won the All Schools



Champion School trophy by one point over strong rivals Guildford Grammar School, the first time since 2018.

All Schools State Championships saw our Juniors bring home 8 gold medals, 3 silver medals and 5 bronze medals, an impressive total of 16 medals.

As the junior rowing program grows from strength to strength, we could not be more thankful for our volunteer coaches who dedicate their time to the next generation of UWABC and WA rowers.

2024 and Beyond

DIRECTOR OF ADMINISTRATION REPORT



The 2024 season saw the clubhouse buzzing with activity beyond training hours. Members actively participated in various fundraising initiatives, social events, and community programmes, with many generously volunteering their time to support the club. Our off-water committee worked tirelessly to organise, coordinate, and oversee these successful events and initiatives.

I extend my heartfelt thanks to my team and all members for their efforts, which have created a vibrant social atmosphere and a highly successful fundraising campaign.

Fundraising

Our 2024 Fundraising Officer, Bianca Fewings, has gone above and beyond in organising, coordinating, and working with UWABC stakeholders to deliver numerous fundraising opportunities and events this season.

We kicked off the year with a movie night at the Windsor Cinema, showing "The Boys in the Boat," which attracted 148 attendees. The 2024 Nationals squad hosted a Quiz Night fundraiser to help support their Penrith travel and competition costs. We also hosted two RWA regattas: Masters Regatta 3 and the All Schools State Championships. Our hosted regattas fundraising was incredibly successful this year, raising over \$8,000.

Additionally, we released two rounds of merchandise in 2024, featuring our UWABC socks, training shirts, and singlets, all of which have proved widely popular with members and alumni and look even better on the water.

Our 105-year celebrations centred around our Gala Dinner, silent auction fundraiser and 24-hour Ergathon. A huge thank you to Bianca Fewings for the tremendous work she put into organising the Ergathon and creating our live social media content throughout the event.

Corporate Rowing

Our Corporate Rowing Program hosted the 16th Battalion, Royal Western Australia Regiment, from the 13th Brigade. The program was led by Portia Knight, who coached

alongside Sarah Knight. The squad trained diligently and impressively over four weeks to prepare for the Corporate Regatta held at Canning Bridge. On the day, Open Women's coxswain Maisy Dawson took the reins and led the crew to victory in the Challenge Plate. A huge thank you to Portia Knight for her coaching and organisation in making this opportunity possible.

Community Programs

Our Community Ergo Classes returned and saw their highest-ever participation, with 23 attendees. Thank you to our volunteer coaches: Bianca Fewings, Ava Myler, Olivia Park, and Gabby Shadlow-Bath.

In March, UWABC ran a Learn to Row program, introducing 7 people to the sport and teaching them foundational techniques and terminology in quads and indoor ergos. Our current Learn to Row program is welcoming 22 participants to on-water rowing, many of whom progressed from our community ergo program. These programs are open to all community members and we encourage people to reach out to us if you are interested in participating.

Thank you to our coaches: Tamsin Keevill, Jacob Minchin, and Guy Rosser (March program), as well as Ava Myler, Ben Clayton, Lucy Eadon, Matteo Murphy, Jacob Minchin, and Bianca Fewings (October program).

UWA Engagement

Our O'Day presence was once again vibrant and energetic, with a stall featuring an ergo competition and plenty of flyers promoting our Season Opener. Collecting 90 expressions of interest forms from the event has contributed significantly to the impressive depth we've seen in our novice squad this year. It was fantastic to see over 15 enthusiastic 2023 members dedicating their time to recruit new faces to the club.

We also supported the UWA Colleges by providing ergos and enthusiastic umpires for their Inter-College Ergo Competition. A few of our own members even competed for their respective colleges, showing their peers how it's done.

Sponsorships

With a new face on Broadway, the club quickly became fans of the new café and eatery Newin, resulting in a sponsorship deal. Thank you to Bianca Fewings and Ben Clayton for securing our bronze sponsorship with Newin, and to our members for continuing to show support through post-training coffees, bagels, and breakie burgers.

Grants

UWABC extends its appreciation for the support received from the Rowley Foundation in 2024. The Rowley Foundation provided funding to support UWABC's Junior Rowing Program with funds used to refurbish equipment and boats and the maintenance and purchase of rowing ergos. We are very appreciative of this much needed support that has supported our junior athletes in their training and racing and also in assisting UWABC in hosting Development Dinners, discussing topics on sleep, nutrition and body mechanics with the Shenton College students.

Social Events

Our 2024 Social Officers, Megan Bateman and Kayla Kalweit, did an outstanding job this season planning, coordinating, and managing logistics and communications to deliver engaging and highly successful social events. Our Season Opener was an incredible afternoon where our 2023 members welcomed new and intrigued recruits through tours of the sheds, a presentation, ice-breaker bingo, and light refreshments. In early April, Megan organised a Nationals Viewing Party at the shed to watch our State team representatives compete in the Interstate races at the Australian Rowing Championships in Penrith on a big screen.

The annual migration to Bunbury took place in April for the Bunbury Sprint Regatta and Eaton Head Race, featuring an evening scavenger hunt throughout the streets and establishments of "Bun-vegas." Members dressed up in pirate-themed attire for an Amazing Race-styled evening, as teams made their way to the final venue using clues and enjoying beverages along the way.

In May, Uni went green for the "Shrekfest Pubcrawl." We sold 67 tickets for the three-pub tour and required two party buses to transport our revelers around Perth. In August, Uni swapped zooties for cocktail attire at the UWABC Cocktail Night at The Globe. Thank you to Kayla for organising the evening, which saw 80 attendees. Lastly, our Annual Dinner, hosted at The University Club of Western Australia, had 75 attendees, including 2024 members, partners, Board members, and Life Members, celebrating individual and club achievements.

Shenton College Rowing Events

In 2024, UWABC saw a significant drive through the Shenton Rowing parent support group for more events to connect our juniors and their families to the club and the program. Thank you to Oliver Cliff, Shenton Coordinator, for working alongside me to organise and deliver new events to the UWABC calendar. Thank you also to Kate Wood and Liza Williams for their tremendous contributions, coordination, and support of these events and the program.

In May, we held the Shenton Development Dinner, which featured three allied health professionals in physiotherapy, sleep, and nutrition, who presented and discussed important aspects of athlete development and training to better inform juniors and their families. This event was hugely successful, attracting 100 attendees. In late June, we held a Shenton Parent Sundowner, a relaxed, casual Friday evening where the juniors entertained by playing "Just Dance," with the parents also getting up to dance.

After the success of the All Schools season, the Shenton Rowing Awards Night in August saw almost 200 attendees celebrate the individual and squad successes of the season. For the first time, the evening was catered, and a red carpet was laid—an effort well worth it for an incredible group of juniors and coaches.


Safety

Our 2024 Safety Officer, Ged Street, has ensured that our facilities, equipment, and operations are as safe as possible at all times. The club has continued to use a streamlined incident reporting procedure with QR codes placed around the shed, allowing members to scan and file reports instantly via a Google Form. These responses are directed to either the Safety Officer (for safety incidents) or the Boat Officer (for equipment damage).

Our coaching dinghies are equipped with first aid kits, space blankets, ventilators, and ropes at all times. With new legislation requiring all passengers to have a life vest in the dinghy, Ged also implemented a mechanism for securely storing life jackets in the bows of the dinghies, removing them from the hulls, which are often wet and sandy. He has ensured that the battery operating systems for the dinghy lights are in working condition throughout the season.

This year, we maintained a plentiful stock of bow lights, always keeping secure spare stock for when the lights in rotation are misplaced or lost to the river. Bow lights don't come cheaply, and most other clubs require members to purchase their own; without Ged's diligence, many crews wouldn't be able to get out on the water.

A "Members Safety" page on the UWABC members website was developed, making available all safety policies and procedures to members, including the Boat Capsize procedure, Shark Safety plan, marine safety, emergency contacts and Lightning and Storm procedure. Following an unfortunate weather event that caused the sinking of numerous club singles, doubles, and a coxed quad at the Old Swan Brewery, a Weather Guide was created. The UWABC Weather Guide aims to inform members about the possible impact of weather patterns experienced in UWA waters throughout the year, enabling them to make better-informed decisions regarding safety while training on the water.


The pontoon is on a high-pressure cleaning schedule with UWA Maintenance. Although more noticeable in winter, higher tides lead to increased algae, moss, and barnacles. Non-slip tape has been applied to the wooden boards, but a more secure solution will be required next winter to reduce risks and prevent slips and falls.

An important aspect of safety is collaborating with the wider rowing community and other clubs. Ged has been an incredible asset to the Rowing WA Safety Working Group, consistently providing recommendations, information, and reporting. As a result, we are safer as a club and as a community.

Membership


Our 2024 Registrar, Tamsin Keevill, has been an invaluable asset to our club. Tamsin has been instrumental in implementing pin payments to simplify fee payments for members, establishing more systematic deadlines for seat fees for regattas, and introducing pre-State Championship fee payments. As a result, we are now experiencing the lowest membership and seat fees owed to the club at the end of season in years.

During the 2024 season the Boat Club had a total of 233 financial members. This is an increase of 22% on the 2023 season total of 190. A total of 53% were new and 47% were continuing or returning members. Compared to all previous years, the club is starting to bounce back to the pre-Covid membership numbers with the percentage of new members this year being the second highest since 2017. With a boost in membership, the Club is directing its focus on strategies to improve our continuing/returning numbers.




This year the gender split between males and females was almost 50:50 with a very slight weighting towards females. The largest age group at the club were the school age (Shenton College) athletes closely followed by the university age group (19-22 yrs), which is reflective

of the target recruitment focus. The club has a loyal and highly competitive Master's squad of around 25 rowers. The 2024 age profile of the club was made up as follows:




The largest single squad and membership type in 2024 was Shenton College which represented 47% of the club. We had 33 members in the Novice Men's and Novice Women's squads which was a massive increase from last year. The Open Women's squad saw a decrease in numbers from 2023, down to 35, and the Open Men's squad stayed relatively stable at 30 members. Our Masters Men's and Masters Women's squads have also kept stable at 4 and 19 members respectively. This year we introduced a new Alumni rowing squad designed for ex-UWABC members who wanted to row socially. This has proven to be quite popular and we now have around 8-10 members on the water every Sunday morning.




In 2024 Shenton College had 108 athletes compared to 66 in the 2023 season, which is an increase of 63% and the largest squad size to date. The Year 9 cohort made up over 50% of the total athlete numbers and the challenge for the club will be to retain this group through to Year 12. Encouragingly, 38% (21 athletes) from the Year 10 and Senior squads continued

training after the All Schools State Championships and competed at the Pennant 4 and RWA State Championships, and many are now training over summer in our Term 4 Summer Rowing program, and a Junior Squad training for the 2025 Nationals regatta in Tasmania.

EQUIPMENT

During the 2024 season we christened the *Andrew Brown* double scull and the *Moornie Maali* coxed quad into our fleet. Both boats made their debut at the State Championships where the *Maali* won Gold in the Men's C Grade 4X+ and the *Brown* secured three Bronze medals in the Champion Men's 2X-, Champion Men's 2- and Men's C Grade 2X-.

Below is an extract of our major rowing equipment as at 30 September 2024 and rated Great, Good, Fair, Poor, or N/A (for wooden boats kept for historical purposes). Over the coming years we aim to turnover our fleet so that all members can learn to row and race with competitive equipment. TREASURER'S REPORT



The 2024 financial year saw the highest income from membership fees in recent years across all squads, alongside strong fundraising revenue, albeit significantly lower than in FY23. The Club purchased an ex-lease Sykes pair "*Andrew Brown*" and was gifted the new "*Moornie Maali*" Sykes coxed quad by an anonymous donor from the Shenton College community, ensuring our junior athletes have access to state-of-the-art equipment to continue their

competitiveness on water.

The increase in membership income was primarily driven by large growth in our junior program with Shenton College, seeing membership nearly double, as well as in our senior programs with a revitalised novice squad and strong open and masters' cohorts.

Fundraising for FY24 was significantly lower than in FY23, due to several factors, particularly the completion of the Future Fund fundraising period which consumed a significant amount of member resources through raising donations at our 24 hour "Ergothon". The club also found difficulty fielding corporate crews which had provided a strong contribution in FY23.

The club concluded FY24 with lower operating expenses than in FY23. This was primarily driven by the one-off expenditure paid for the printing run of the "Come Forward, Uni!" history book completed in FY23 and a lower spend on paid coaches, with areas such as racing fees seeing a significant increase with our higher membership numbers.

The club continued to grow its fleet with the additions of the "*Andrew Brown*" and "*Moornie Maali*" in FY24, while the weaker financial result of FY23 saw other areas of capital expenditure such as oars and coaches' dinghies receive less, something the Committee expects to reverse in FY25.

The Club finished the 2024 financial year with an \$83,261 net surplus, which is an historically high result achieved by the tireless efforts of our members to keep the Club strong and growing. This surplus will provide new opportunities for the incoming 2025 Committee to consult with members on how it is best utilised and will put the club in good financial stead for the commitment of paying a full-time Head Coach.
